Finance and Stewardship Committee Report on Financial Condition For 3 Months Ended March 31, 2022

The financial condition of the church deteriorated in the first 3 months of 2022 as offerings fell 14.2% below 2021 amounts. As a result, the cash available to pay bills fell to \$45.9 thousand at March 31. This represents a decline of \$12.8 thousand. In comparison,



the same period in 2021 saw an increase of \$5.1 thousand. Wheras the decline in the cash was not unexpected, the severity of the decline, especially in March is concerning. The cash available represents about 1.25 months of spending.

Costs exceeded February and March worry. Total costs for \$96.5 thousand, or 2021. There were no expenses during the with the costs month, averaging this trend continues, 2022 will be about

Total income for the first quarter totaled \$83.8 thousand, 15.5% lower than 2021 and is



concerning as we progress towards the summer. Most of the church's income is derived from pledges and offerings. These totaled \$69.9 thousand and trailed 2021 amount by 14.2%. This decrease in actual offerings compares to a budgeted increase of about 5%. For those reluctant to attend services in person due to Covid-19, the church offers the option to make gifts and offering online. Anyone interested in

The Finance and Stewardship Committe will continue to monitor the church's financial condition and will be offering ideas on how to increase income, or other sources of funds, and areas where costs can be reduced along with participating in the Church Revitalization Project.
