#### Dear Members and Friends of the Baldwinsville First United Methodist Church,

Grace to you, and peace from God who creates, saves, and sustains us!

I am going to take this space – usually used for a seasonal word of encouragement within our newsletter – to address a national issue of concern and conversation. I want to take just a moment to speak to the recent ruling of the Supreme Court in the case of Dobbs vs Jackson Women's Health Organization. I have received several calls and I have spent some time in conversation with members of our congregation around this and heard from several of these saints that the information we shared might benefit our larger church family.

Without speaking to the merits of the case, or the arguments presented in the majority opinion or the minority dissent, I want to share with you the position of the United Methodist Church regarding the complex and difficult issue of abortion and reproductive rights. It is a nuanced and prayerful position, developed over years of discussion in the church, recognizing the sanctity of unborn life but also recognizing that there are tragic moments when the life of the unborn child may threaten the life and wellbeing of the mother.

Here is what the United Methodist Church has to say about the issue of abortion, choice, and the sometimes terribly difficult decision about when (or if) to end a pregnancy, From our United Methodist Book of Discipline Paragraph 161K:

"Our belief in the sanctity of unborn human life makes us reluctant to approve abortion.

"But we are equally bound to respect the sacredness of the life and well-being of the mother and the unborn child.

"We recognize tragic conflicts of life with life that may justify abortion, and in such cases we support the legal option of abortion under proper medical procedures by certified medical providers. We cannot affirm abortion as an acceptable means of birth control, and we unconditionally reject it as a means of gender selection or eugenics (see Resolution 3184).

"We oppose the use of late-term abortion...and call for the end of this practice except when the physical life of the mother is in danger and no other medical procedure is available, or in the case of severe fetal anomalies incompatible with life. This procedure shall be performed only by certified medical providers.

"We call all Christians to a searching and prayerful inquiry into the sorts of conditions that may cause them to consider abortion. We entrust God to provide guidance, wisdom, and discernment to those facing an unintended pregnancy.

"The Church shall offer ministries to reduce unintended pregnancies. We commit our Church to continue to provide nurturing ministries to those who terminate a pregnancy, to those in the midst of a crisis pregnancy, and to those who give birth.

"We mourn and are committed to promoting the diminishment of high abortion rates. The Church shall encourage ministries to reduce unintended pregnancies such as comprehensive, age-appropriate sexuality education, advocacy in regard to contraception, and support of initiatives that enhance the quality of life for all women and girls around the globe."

I appreciate the spectrum of opinions and experiences that we have as a community of faith, and I look forward to visiting with anyone who would like to talk. I am praying for you and for our nation.

#### A Summer Garden Labyrinth Walk: (Prayers, Relaxation, Reflections and Fellowship)

On <u>Saturday</u>, July 9, 2022, at 10:00 a.m., meet our Pastors and the Hands of Hope Group to walk the nearby outdoor beautiful garden Labyrinth, at St. Augustine Church, 7333 O'Brien Road, Baldwinsville, New York (near McNamara Elementary School). Prayers, Relaxation, Reflections, Fellowship, and light refreshments. Walking the Labyrinth is optional.

Please wear your comfortable shoes and bring a folding lawn chair if you have one. Extra chairs will be available. All are welcome. No RSVP needed. Free.

Why Walk the Labyrinth? (from: Labyrinth - First United Methodist Church (fumcboulder.org))

John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, invited the country folk of his time to find a method to listen and live from their deepest source of life within as a means to find their wholeness and creativity. He suggested we become dissipated when we rely on the world to tell us who we "are". This dissipation would lead to a path of misery because the world is impermanent and always changing.

Consequently, Wesley encouraged each person to develop a method to recollect themselves and journey inward to their sacred center which is abundantly alive and our true nature. Walking the Labyrinth is one of many methods to find a spacious and peaceful simplicity within. The Labyrinth provides a space to listen to one's inner and outer world and find a slower pace in our busy lives.

Rev. Lauren Artress suggests "by following the one path to the center, the seeker can use the Labyrinth to quiet the mind and find peace and illumination at the center of his or her being. The walk and all that happens on it, can be grasped through the intuitive, pattern-discerning faculty of the person walking it."

The Labyrinth is open to anyone and any tradition to walk, because it does not require a doctrine to walk meditatively. Adults and children both find the Labyrinth beneficial, and it can be danced, skipped, crawled, or even walked with a cane. "The seeker is only asked to put one foot in front of the other. By stepping into the Labyrinth we are choosing once again to walk the spiritual path."

This Labyrinth is in the form of a circle with a meandering path from the edge to the center and back out again – large enough to be walked into and out of. The Labyrinth has only one path and once we make the choice to enter it, the path becomes a metaphor for our journey through life. Everybody is invited to walk the Labyrinth!!!

#### The Stranger in the Lifeboat by Mitch Albom

What would happen if we called on God for help and God actually appeared? In Mitch Albom's profound new novel of hope and faith, a group of shipwrecked passengers pull a strange man from the sea. He claims to be "the Lord." And he says he can only save them if they all believe in him.

Adrift in a raft after a deadly ship explosion, ten people struggle for survival at sea. Three days pass. Short on water, food and hope, they spot a man floating in the waves. They pull him in.

So begins Mitch Albom's most beguiling and inspiring novel yet. ponders what we would do if, after crying out for divine help, God actually appeared before us? What might the Lord look, sound and act like?

Last month, the preschoolers of Baldwinsville Nursery School wrapped up an extraordinarily successful school year with a variety of ceremonies and celebrations. Our kindergarten-bound (4-year-old program) students enjoyed a carnival in the multipurpose room. This end-of-year celebration has become a traditional last-week-of-school event at BNS. What makes the carnival extra special is that the kids actually earn this party through daily acts of kindness in the classroom for the whole 2<sup>nd</sup> half of the school year. In the 5 years of this tradition, no class has missed out on earning themselves *Kindness Karnval* fun!

The final culmination of the school year for 4-year-old program students was a beautiful graduation ceremony, held traditionally on the Thursday evening of the final week of school. This year, BNS "graduated" 29 preschoolers. Their families were invited to the Church sanctuary where they delighted in seeing their little ones cross the stage (AKA the altar) and switch over the tassels on their homemade graduation caps before treating their guests to a few sweet songs. Graduation evening ended with cupcakes and fellowship in the dining room where the children were simply elated to be with their classmates, teachers, and families all in one place at the same time! Among the adults, sentiments were more bittersweet as gifts, cards, hugs, and words of gratitude were exchanged between parents and teachers.

The BNS 3-year-old class students have a special way of ending the school year as well. Instead of coming to school as usual on the final scheduled day, students and parents meet teachers at Mercer Park where they have a blast playing on such a "big kid" playground structure before the special surprise arrives: an ice cream truck! Students and their younger siblings enjoy a treat while parents and teachers share memories of the school year before goodbye hugs ensue. The best part of this group farewell is when all parties can say "see you in September!" since many are enrolled in a BNS class for the 2022-23 school year. The same is true for our classes of 2-year-old children, who, on the last day, get to go on the BNS/BFUMC playground for the first time!

Given the extreme challenges of staying open safely through the height of the COVID-19 global pandemic years, combined with the fact that the school served more families than ever before in its history, the end of this school year calls for a feeling of particular satisfaction to be shared among the BNS staff, the 76 families that spent the year with us and the Church community. What a mutual blessing: the school is immensely fortunate to be able to operate in the wonderful facility that is the BFUMC. Likewise, our Church leadership and congregation should take great pride and pleasure in having Baldwinsville Nursery School, this long-established and reputable private preschool that has served families in the Baldwinsville community for 47 years, doing such good and important work through our building. Having BNS in our building brings young families into our facility and benefits us financially as well. Due to the high enrollment rate this past school year, the preschool increased its facilities fee payment to the Church by \$3,000.00! The 2021-2022 school year was one to be celebrated by all! BNS looks forward to a restful summer and return to school in September.

Greetings Baldwinsville First Congregation! As I sit here deciding what to write to you I am getting ready for a meeting tomorrow night with SPRC for my first-year review. This has been a wonderful year in many different ways – musically, spiritually and personally.
